STEWARSDHIP CORNER

How Much Time Do I Have to Give?

Last month's Lesson 4 Bible Study insert provided ample thoughts and insightful references on how Jesus managed His time. It asked us how we manage our time. Jesus spent approximately 33 years of living here on earth, but about 3 years of activity in doing His Father's work. In those 3 years, Jesus taught, trained, and demonstrated to His disciples. *Nearly 2000 years later*, we are still learning and following His teachings and ways!

Talk about an impact! Not only impactful, but in addition to all the teaching and wisdom we have been given, God gave His Son for us and for our eternal salvation. Does it get any better?

Jesus had the same 1440 minutes per day as we do. He did not fly, drive, or Uber from site to site. Nor did He call ahead to the Holiday Inn for a room or make dinner reservations at Da Vinci's. It was tiring. As we learned, Jesus removed Himself and His disciples from the crowds to pray and rest. But the next day, He was about His Father's business.

The close of the Church Year shifts our focus toward what awaits followers of Christ after their earthly lifetimes draw to an end. This shift starts with the Commemoration of All Saints on the first Sunday in November. During Divine Service on that day, we will hear about the blessed presence of the LORD's people in eternity and our anticipation of seeing Jesus with our own eyes in the Day of the Resurrection.

What is talked about on All Saints Sunday presents a goal for us to desire while we live on earth. We rightly show gratitude to the LORD for His providential care, including all that we need for this body and life. We will do that in a very intentional way later in November on Thanksgiving Day. Yet, we know that as good as those temporal benefits from the LORD are, they aren't perfect. Even more so, the world in which we live and where we receive those good things is flawed. Possessions wear away. Strength of body wanes. We face illness and death, along with other matters that cause sorrow.

As we progress through November, the Sunday Gospel Readings will convey Jesus' teaching about trials and tribulations that His followers will face in this lifetime. These include the rising up of false teachers, persecutions against Christians, even wars and natural disasters. Jesus discloses these things, so that His people won't be caught unaware. Believers shouldn't be surprised about such matters. Instead, they should be prepared for them.

The preparation that Jesus wants for His followers will allow them to endure to the end. Such endurance isn't rooted in their own abilities, but by being tied to Jesus and His spiritual gifts. Maintaining that tie necessitates constancy in receiving the benefits that Jesus distributes through His Gospel. This is how the Holy Spirit is given to believers and remains with them. Through the Spirit's work, believers will be made wise to salvation, guided in the truth of Jesus' teachings and ways of life, and kept firm in their confession of faith. The result of all that will bring great joy to them at Jesus' return.

That is why Jesus urges His disciples to be alert and ready for His return: "But concerning that day or that hour, no one knows, not even the angels in heaven, nor the Son, but only the Father. Be on guard, keep awake. For you do not know when the time will come.... And what I say to you I say to all: Stay awake." (Mk 13:32-33, 37)

That is why the Apostle John directs Christians to holy living that imitates Jesus: "Beloved, we are God's children now, and what we will be has not yet appeared; but we know that when he appears we shall be like him, because we shall see him as he is. And everyone who thus hopes in him purifies himself as he is pure." (1]n 3:2:3)

That is why the Author of Hebrews exhorts Christians to diligence in discipleship: "Let us hold fast the confession of our hope without wavering, for he who promised is faithful. And let us consider how to stir up one another to love and good works, not neglecting to meet together, as is the habit of some, but encouraging one another, and all the more as you see the Day drawing near."(Heb 10:23-25)

These instructions are given with a future end in mind. Christ's followers aren't to be fully absorbed with the concerns and troubles of today, solely focused on the present and temporal. Why shouldn't that be so? Because something greater is promised for us, as we will sing on All Saints Sunday:

But, lo, there breaks a yet more glorious day: The saints triumphant rise in bright array; The King of Glory passes on His way. Alleluia! [LSB 677:7]

So what are we to do with our time? Just imagine if **each one of us** would give an additional 5, 10, or 15 minutes of our availability in stewarding what God entrusts to us. What **impact** would we have at Calvary, our workplace, our community, our family? Our significance, as Christians, is to spread the Good News whenever, wherever, and in whatever Christian fashion we can with our time.

In last month's Stewardship Corner, the old pastor dispensed theological wisdom. Pick a number of minutes and keep increasing. *When you begin to miss the time stop at that point*. Note he didn't say stop what you are doing; he said stop at that point. Then, as Jesus did, pray and rest, then start again.

NOTES: Other Income includes contributions to the Education Wing Roof Replacement Fund Drive and the Robert Wallick Estate Gift that was designated for the Endowment Fund. Mortgage Expenses include payment of remaining Renovation Funds collected in 2023 toward the principal of renovation loans. Non-Budgeted Expenses include transfer of the Robert Wallick Estate Gift to the Endowment Fund (\$35,000) and payment of the Education Wing roof replacement project (\$44,430).

NEW INITIATIVE: EMERGENCY FOOD BOXES

Five emergency food boxes for veterans have been readied for distribution. This was made possible with the assistance of a Thrivent Action Team Grant.

ONGOING INITIATIVE: MOVE OUT BOXES

Move Out boxes are being assembled for formerly homeless veterans who are moving from transitional housing into permanent housing. The Operation Barnabas Committee is looking into potential grant opportunities to support this activity. As additional information on this initiative is obtained it will be reported in future issues of the *Calvary Comment*.

Your willingness to continue to donate clothing, and to come to the church working hours to pull it all together, are testimonies to your desire to serve God, our church, and our community.



OCTOBER 2024 CHURCH COUNCIL NOTES

- Pastor reported that Rev. Robert Kieselowsky has been appointed to serve as District Vice-President, replacing Rev. Douglas Spittel. He also announced the Fall 2024/Winter 2025 holiday worship service schedule.
- Treasurer reported that the Education Wing roof replacement invoice was fully paid in September. Registration costs for the 2025 LCMS National Youth Gathering attendees have been paid.
- Trustees reported that replacement of the Education Wing hallway carpet damaged by previous HVAC system leaks had been completed.
- Revisions for portions of the congregation's constitution and bylaws drafted by Officers and Boards were distributed for review and evaluation.
- Finance Committee presented the proposed 2025 financial work plan (budget) for review by the Council. This will be presented to the Voters Assembly for approval in November. Presentation about the proposal included discussion about the income needed to meet expenditures.
- Finance Committee suggested that the Endowment Fund portion of the congregational bylaws should be revised and that consideration should be given to having Finance Committee members appointed to staggered terms longer than one year.
- Council members were reminded about deadlines for submitting reports and business items for the Voters Assembly Meeting on November 17.
